Eakin Elementary follows four guiding principles in NCLB:

- 1. We teach students using standards-based curriculum and scientifically based methods proven to be successful.
- 2. We are accountable for demonstrating that all students are meeting academic goals each year. Schools not making progress or meeting annual targets in reading or math are in designated as "focus" or "priority" schools.
- 3. Teachers and instructional paraprofessionals must be highly qualified. School districts must develop plans to ensure highly qualified teachers and instructional paraprofessionals are in Title I funded programs.
- 4. Parents must be given more information, rights and choices concerning their child's education. NCLB states parents have a right . . .
 - 1. to have access to their child's individual performance levels on the statewide assessments,
 - 2. to know if their child's school is making progress (links to Ohio Department of Education Local Report Cards)
 - 3. to know the qualifications of their child's teachers, and
 - 4. to be informed if their child is being taught by a substitute or a non-highly qualified teacher for longer than four consecutive weeks.

Dear Eakin Families,

Welcome to the 2023-2024 school year. This year we will have a Welcome Back Opening Circle in the Breakfast room on Wednesday, August 23, 2023. All families are invited to come to school for our Strong Start Opening. We will have light refreshments for parents. Our Opening Circle will begin at 8:45 am with staff introductions, and a welcoming energizer for the students. Following the Opening Circle, students will be dismissed by their homeroom teacher. Parents are welcome to stay and walk to your child's classroom. This will give you the opportunity to support your students as they begin the 2023-2024 school year.

The first day of school is Wednesday, August 23, 2023. Students in 1st - 5th grade will begin right away. I encourage students to dress for the warm weather with consideration of our dress code, which is in the 2023-2024 Guide to Student Success. Water bottles are welcome if they contain water and can be sealed.

Our kindergarten students will start Monday, August 28, 2023, your kindergarten student's teacher will be calling to set up a time for you to bring in your student to complete the Kindergarten Assessment. Pre-Kindergarten students will begin their program on September 7, 2023. Your Pre-Kindergarten student's teacher will be contacting you soon.

As a reminder each student will receive FREE breakfast and lunch. Breakfast will begin at 8:30; I encourage all students to participate in the meal program.

School will begin promptly at 9:00. Teachers will welcome students into the classrooms beginning at 8:45 am. After 9:00 students must visit the office to receive a tardy slip. It is important that students arrive to school on time ready to learn.

Each family is encouraged to check their parent portal to complete the annual update. This is important to verify that we have the most recent information.

Enjoy the last few days of summer, and plan on becoming a partner in your student's education.

Student's Day

- Hours of Instruction The school day for students in kindergarten through fifth grade is 9:00-3:15.
- Recommended Arrival Time –Breakfast begins at 8:30, students may arrive beginning at 8:30 for breakfast. At 8:45 students will report to the classroom.
- Dismissal Time and Dismissal Procedure Dismissal time is 3:20. We will dismiss students by sibling groups. All students will exit out the side door near the gymnasium. This will ensure all families are gathered prior to exiting the building. Students who ride a school bus will wait in the gymnasium until the bus arrives.

School Sign-out Proceedures

If you need to sign-out a student during the school day, please be aware of the following procedures that keep your student safe at school:




IDENTIFICATION IS REQUIRED WHEN SIGNING OUT A STUDENT.

Any students being picked up early must be signed out by a relative / adult that is listed in Infinite Campus. Parent's can list adults allowed to pick-up their student in the Parent Portal. If an unlisted adult needs to pick up a student, the listed Guardian MUST call the school office at 614-365-5928.

STUDENTS WILL NOT BE RELEASED BETWEEN 3:00 - 3:15 PM.

If your student has a doctor's appointment after 3:00 or you just want to pick them up early, please sign them out BEFORE 3:00pm. This will prevent the interruption of the teaching process. Students are dismissed starting at 3:20, but teaching continues up until that time. We appreciate your concern for your students continued and uninterrupted education. We thank you in advance for your cooperation in this matter.



School Absences

The Annual Update can be accessed in the Parent Portal by first clicking on "More"

and then "Annual Update." If your scholar has a form on file and he or she is remaining at the same school for 2023-2024, a new form will <u>not</u> have to be submitted. Separate forms must be on file for each individual student.

<u>Promotion – Retention</u>

When there is a possibility a student might be considered for retention it is vital to follow the following protocol:

- 1. The student is brought through the MTSS process
- 2. The student is brought through the IAT process
- 3. Parent conferences have been completed
- 4. Indication of concern on the report card
- 5. Conference with Principal

A letter should accompany the second progress report. This letter indicates the child is not doing passing work, requests a parent conference and requires a parent signature as evidence of receipt. If student progress does not improve, a second letter goes home with the third progress report indicating the possibility of retention and requests a parent conference and requires a parent signature as evidence of receipt. A student should be considered for retention only if the above procedures have been followed. (A check is to be made in the appropriate box on the progress report at the time of the second and third progress reports to indicate retention is being considered.) The teacher must make principal aware of all students who are not progressing at the appropriate level prior to winter recess.

The Columbus City Schools Board of Education amended its Promotion and Retention Policy on September 7, 1999. The policy as amended provides for the following:

Promotion

The policy advocates that **all** students making satisfactory progress and determined by teachers and principals to be academically prepared to meet all state standards and district benchmarks will be promoted to the next grade level.

Retention

In grades K-6, a student will be retained if he or she:

- 1. Has been truant more than 10% of the required attendance days and
- 2. Has failed two or more required curriculum subjects, unless it is determined that the student is academically prepared to be promoted to the next grade level by the principal and the teacher(s) of the subjects failed.

Columbus City Schools will provide Summer Remediation services, including Summer School, to all third grade students who are reading below grade level. It will also provide Summer Remediation services to all 4th and 6th grade students who have failed three or more sections of the Ohio Proficiency test. Information on Columbus' Summer School Programs will be available at schools in February, and application forms will be available in schools or on the district's web page in April. For additional information on the Summer Remediation services, please call the Summer School Office at 365-5300.

HOMEWORK

The staff at Eakin Elementary believes that homework serves our students in several areas. It is an excellent way to reinforce new concepts and to provide guided practice in basic skills. Homework also serves to share new-found knowledge with parents. Many assignments are designed to encourage and promote parent/student/school interaction.

Grades kindergarten-5 all assign homework. All homework is checked and evaluated for completion and accuracy. Primary grade classrooms may provide rewards for timely return and completion of homework. Upper grades require that unfinished class work be completed as homework in addition to work that is assigned to be completed at home. Parents are encouraged to stay in close communication with their student's teacher.

Dismissal of a Student during School Hours

- * Students being dismissed from school during school hours must check out through the office.
- ❖ If a child has a doctor or dental appointment, the parent should send a note informing the teacher of the time and come to school to sign out the child in a book provided in the office. If the child can return before the end of the day, the parent should sign the child in upon returning. The same rules apply for other early dismissals. Students should not be released to walk home alone.
- ❖ Students will be excused for medical, dental, or Children's Hospital appointment; however, the student will be marked absent for the full or half day as required. When proper excuse notes are presented the absence will be excused and all work may be made up.
